

**Interesting Oregon Histories**

If you are interested in the history of Oregon you might try the following documents found on the internet.

1. **The History of Wasco County, Oregon** by William H. McNeal. This book was originally published in 1953

and has been re-edited and reprinted by his descendant. It is somewhat hard to read in places but contains a host of historical information about Wasco County, City of The Dalles and the people living there.

The book is sold at [www.QuintenPublications.com](http://www.QuintenPublications.com) or type in the name of the book at your search engine and it should get you to other places it can be found.

2. **An Illustrated History of Central Oregon** and was published by the Western Historical Publishing Company, Spokane, WA., 1905.

This book contains histories of Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Wheeler, Crook, Lake and Klamath counties. Hood river County was still part of Wasco County at the time.

The Wasco County book is divided into three parts, Historical Information, Biographical Information, and Portraits. You can print any portions of the book that you wish just remember that Wasco and Hood river Counties were all one at the time.

This book is filled with a lot of history and the Biographical names and photo's can be accessed by clicking on the item or person you want to see.

This book is very well done and easy to select the chapters, bio's and pictures you want.

# History Tidbit: Maryhill - Biggs Ferry

The first ferry in the Maryhill-Biggs area was established in 1868 by William Hicenbotham. During the early and middle 1880s ferry business was such that two ferries ran simultaneously. Historian Jeffrey Elmer (Rootsweb.com, 2006) quotes from the Goldendale Sentinel June 15, 1944:

"... Wagon and teams were crossed for the sum of three dollars, and horse and rider were charged one dollar. During this period, the early, and middle eighties, business increased so that two ferries were run simultaneously, the "Nellie" with its accompanying sail barge at the upper landing where the present ferry docks; and the "Rattler," a self-propelled boat with the steam engine installed in the barge, at the lower landing, about a mile west of the upper landing. These two, the "Nellie" and the "Rattler,"

together carried the shore-to-shore traffic until the year 1889, when the "Rattler" was sold and put into service as a ferry at Ainsworth, near the Snake-Columbia junction. The faithful "Nellie" continued service up until 1903, when it burned. This marked the end of the era of steam on the upper Columbia. ..."

The same 1944 Goldendale Sentinel also stated:

"... In 1915 a ferry was reestablished at the lower landing. In February of that year Samuel Hill launched the "Governor West." This ran for five years, giving way to the "Everyday Ferry."

After little more than a year ferry at the lower landing was discontinued and was never re-established. ..."

The Klickitat County Agriculturist, Goldendale, Washington, April 24, 1924, stated that entrepreneur Sam Hill announced he would run a ferry from Maryhill to Biggs.

"... In spite of vigorous opposition by the owners of the present ferry at Maryhill, the board of county commissioners have granted Samuel Hill, good roads booster and owner of a 5000-acre farm at Maryhill, a license to operate a ferry from the Klickitat shore to the Oregon side, at the mouth of Spanish Hollow, not far from the railway station of Biggs. H.G. Van Allen, John H. Johnson, and Ralph L. MacDonald, doing business as the Maryhill Ferry Company, and who hold a Klickitat county license, resisted the granting of a license to Mr. Hill on the ground that issuance of a license to him would be an infringement on rights granted under their license. Hills states that his ferry will be a connecting

Sam Hill's ferry began operations in 1925 and held five cars placed in a single line.

Hill boasted that the ferry would make the round-trip from Maryhill to Biggs in 10 minutes.

The January 15, 1931 Goldendale Sentinel, Goldendale, Washington, in a report on the proposed The Dalles Bridge, stated that the The Dalles to Grand Dalles ferry had an income of \$17,250 per year, the Maryhill to Biggs ferry made \$25,700 per year, the Roosevelt to Arlington ferry made \$30,000 per year and the Lyle to Rowena ferry made "about \$9,000 per year".

The 1942 U.S. Department of Commerce and Labor Coast and Geodetic Survey's "United States Coast Pilot, Pacific Coast", Serial No.69 lists four ferries across the Columbia upstream of The Dalles:



"... Four ferries cross the Columbia River above The Dalles as follows: Biggs-Maryhill, 16 statute miles; Arlington-Roosevelt, 50 statute miles; Boulder-Alderdale, 65 statute miles; and Irrigon-Coolidge, 88 statute miles...."

The last run of the Maryhill ferry was in 1962. From the Mt. Adams Sun, Bingen,

Washington, November 15, 1962: "... The Maryhill Ferry which has criss crossed the Columbia for 94 years ended its last run at 7:59 a.m. Thursday, November 1. Nine ferrymen lost their jobs to make way for the new \$2.4 million Sam Hill Memorial Bridge which opened to traffic at high noon...."

Washington, November 15, 1962: "... The Maryhill Ferry which has criss crossed the Columbia for 94 years ended its last run at 7:59 a.m. Thursday, November 1. Nine ferrymen lost their jobs to make way for the new \$2.4 million Sam Hill Memorial Bridge which opened to traffic at high noon...."

Bridges have replaced all but four ferries across the Columbia. The ones still operating are at Megler, Cathlamet, Roosevelt and Verneta, all in Washington. ..."

### Flash Drives, Thumb Sticks – Whatever you Call Them

Here is an e-mail discussion on Flash or Thumb drives that I received recently from a friend who is a retired IBM research scientist/University Science Professor. The first part of the discussion is from a friend of his – also a retired IBM research scientist, who writes– "I am frequently asked about Flash or Thumb drives. I always answer that they are great, BUT --- Here is a pretty good Q&A on the topic that came across my desk this morning.

**Question:** I have a flash disk that has been working well for quite some time. Just yesterday it refused to work. The computer recognized it but when I tried

opening it I got the message that the disk needs formatting. I tried using it on another computer but the same message appeared. I also tried autoplay but nothing happened. The data on the disk is very important and I need to recover it. Please advise.

**Answer:** I really have no answer for you. I honestly believe that your data is gone. For anyone who uses a USB flash drive, there are two extremely important lessons to learn here, one of which applies to everyone– flash drive user or not.

#### #1 - Flash Drives Wear Out

Apparently many people still don't realize this, but flash memory wears out the more you write to it. How quickly it wears out will depend on the specific flash drive. Like anything, there is a wide range of quality in currently available flash memory based drives. You can make a rough correlation with the cost of the device but even that tends to change over time. Depending on usage and quality we could be talking as short as months or as long as several years. I've seen extreme cases of misuse lasting as little as a few weeks, or in one case, just a few hours!

**Flash memory wears out the more you write to it.** As you've seen, when they fail, they can fail catastrophically. Just one bad bit or sector in the wrong place can render the device unrecoverable to anything short of a complete reformat. Not only will a reformat lose all your data, but it may not work, and the device will fail again, and probably very soon.

#### #2 - Never Keep Important Data in Only One Place

I want to empathize that, because it applies to much more than just flash drives. **Never, ever,** keep anything that is important in only one place; be it a flash drive, a hard drive or a web service. As you can see, if that "one place" goes away, so does your important data. **Forever!** Critical data on a single flash drive? You're asking for trouble. Family photos on a single hard disk? Plan on losing them all someday.

The obvious solution, of course, is to backup. Naturally, a lot of people get intimidated by that, because backing up seems big and complicated and scary. It doesn't have to be but even if it is, get over it or risk losing everything you've stored. Backing up can be as simple as making a periodic copy of your data on

another device. In this case specifically, having had a backup could have saved your data. As it is ... I think you're out of luck. [End of original e-mail.]

The discussion goes on to talk about the importance of keeping the backup file– whatever it is on – in a separate place from the computer. At home if the computer is at work– at work or in the workshop or another separate building if the computer is in the house and so on, and my friend adds "We think of data loss as **component** failure, but the reality is that reliable components have been trashed by car accidents, fires and overturned double espresso lattes– with or without whipped cream. I have slightly edited the email for length but have not changed the information in any way. Remember that these fellows spent a large part of their lives working in IBM Research Labs. They know what they're talking about!

### Genealogy Information from U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services

In 2008, the U. S. government, through the above office, began offering a service for genealogists wherein they will run a search for information about deceased family members. The cost is \$20.00 to \$35.00 per individual. The researchers there will look at naturalization files, visa applications, and citizenship tests. Previously, one had to file a Freedom of Information Act request to acquire the information from these documents and sometimes wait years for the result. Currently, "requests are usually completed within 90 days" according to Anna Gorman of the *Los Angeles Times*, as reported in *The Herald* of Everett.
