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

This was so enjoyable that we drove to St. Louis Cemetery nearby for more pictures. The upshot was that the compiler bought a camera and continued field trips which eventually resulted in personal visits at least once to 437 cemeteries, burial sites in Oregon". The book is dedicated to Darlene Dickson Albert."

Two-thirds of Americans want to know more about their family history

More than half of Americans don't know the names of all four of their grandparents, new research suggests. A recent survey of 2,113 U.S. adults, including 1,911 from the top 10 Nielsen DMAs and 202 from Salt Lake City, found that there is a massive knowledge gap in more recent family history.

Colorizing photos now availble on Ancestry

Ancestry, has integrated an automatic colorization feature that it says lets users bring make black and white photos more lifelike. The company says it already enables the ability to capture, digitize, retouch, and preserve old family photos, but it is now adding the ability to colorize them with a new tool. This allows users to gain "a more vivid, real-life snapshot of ancestors and their lives." ~Ancestry

A Spotlight on The Dalles Library Genealogical Desk

One of the areas most comprehensive resources for genealogy research is The Dalles - Wasco County Library. The materials within this institution covers not only Wasco County and Oregon but genealogical material from all over the world. Newer publications as well as vintage publications. Vital records, journals, family written histories, cemetery records, newspaper transcripts and microfilm make up the bulk of the collection as well as a comprehensive card file which most of which has been collected and maintained by Lorna Elliot, retired library employee. Over the years Ms. Elliot with the help of the Columbia Gorge Genealogical Society provided books, gleaned newspapers, copied obituaries, collected family and historical stories to provide the family researcher rich and valuable information. Ms.Elliot was one of the first members of the society and has always had a profound interest in family history. She has been a mentor for many genealogy enthusiasts and provided many hours to volunteering for CGGS. Lorna also is a member of the Wasco County Historical Society where you can find her manning a table at the I.O.O.F. Cemetery on every Memorial Day.

"Persistence is the secret to success"



On October 18, 1873, the Oregon Pioneer Society was reorganized as the Oregon Pioneer Association (OPA). The group continued to hold annual meetings each June, usually around the June 15 "Pioneer Day" holiday, with stenographic reports of these meetings published in pamphlet form for the historical record.

In 1874 the Oregon Pioneer Association offered to merge with the Oregon Historical Society, but the offer was declined, apparently due to the latter group's intention to limit itself to historical study rather than fraternal interaction.

The OPA remained financially and socially viable well into the decade of the 1880s.[1] There followed a 15-year decline, as death took its toll and the membership and associated dues revenue which supported the Oregon Pioneer Association plummeted.

The OPA entered into partnership with a new organization, the Native Sons of Oregon in 1899, along with another aging and declining fraternal organization of the pioneer period, the Indian War Veterans of the North Pacific Coast. Due to its declining numbers inevitably resulting from the deaths of eligible members, the Oregon Pioneer Association was largely supplanted in 1901 by the Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers, a new fraternal and historical association with less stringent eligibility requirements for its members. The OPA proper continued in existence, holding annual meetings through 1928.

Issues of the Oregon Native Son contained accounts of historical events, pioneer travels, biographies of pioneers and notable families who settled in Oregon and Indian War and Civil War accounts from veterans and their families.

The above association was established at the state fair grounds on September 25, 1885, by veterans who participated in the Indian wars of the Pacific Northwest, which were fought prior to i860. The objects of the association are "to keep alive the memories of the trials of pio neer life, to encourage friendship and benevolence among those who have acted as the vanguard of civilization, to trans mit a true history of the Indian wars of the North Pacific coast, and to impress ourselves and our posterity with that true patriotism which protects our homes from all evils, both by war and peace.

They made barns too!

This article is from the latest newsletter from the Idaho Historical Society and features this story of the barn of George Obendorf of Wilder, Idaho. 1915

For National Dairy Month, the Idaho State Historic Preservation Office is highlighting the National Register-listed George Obendorf, Gothic Arch Truss Barn near Wilder. You may have heard of mailorder catalog homes from Sears, Roebuck & Co., but did you know that you could also order a kit barn?

The barn was built in 1915 and is a pre-manufactured structure shipped by rail in its component parts to Wilder and assembled by local carpenters and the family for their dairying operations. Sears began selling mail-order kit homes in 1908 with all the necessary plans, instructions, and materials required for construction by a local builder or the owner. After the success of the kit homes, Sears started selling plans and components for barns in 1911. The Chicago-based corporation expanded its farm building program in 1918 with a stand-alone "The Book of Barns" catalog, which continued until the Great Depression began.

The Honor-Bilt Division of Sears, Roebuck & Co, had been operating a highly successful mail order house and farm building business since 1908. All materials were precut and finished by Honor-Bilt, and shipped by rail to be assembled by the customer. In 1915 George Obendorf ordered one of Honor-Bilt's newest offerings, a 42' by 60' Gothic Arch Truss horse and dairy barn, for which he paid \$1,500. The barn was assembled by local craftsmen and members of the Obendorf family during the summer of 1915.

Founded by Richard Sears and Alvah Roebuck in 1886, Sears, Roebuck & Co. earned its 20th century designation as the "world's largest store" primarily through its catalog sales. In addition to its exhaustive general catalogs, Sears also published kit-home catalogs—which were distributed beginning in 1908 —that led to the sale of more than 70,000 residences in 30 years. Available in more than 370 styles as well as custom options, each kit contained most of the materials required to construct a wood-framed residence, with the exception of heavy masonry or concrete materials, which could be obtained locally. Once a house was in place, homeowners could then turn to Sears' how-to books on painting, electrical wiring, and plumbing for maintenance needs.

With nearly 100 Sears building products catalogs, the BTHL chronicles both the evolution of residential design and the history of the mail-order-turned-department store corporation.
