#### Lyle Area Will Make or Break the Park & Recreation District

The Mount Adam's Park and Recreation District vote will be on the ballot coming mid-October. Please take time to consider your vote. The Lyle area (Dallesport, High Prairie and Lyle) are key in getting the district initiative to pass and be funded. The creation of the district only takes 50% plus one, but the levy will require 60% plus one, so our vote will be critical. You will need to vote 'Yes' twice to create and fund the new district.

The District is NOT just about a swimming pool for White Salmon. Many people from areas

around the county are running for commissioners, and they will decide what the money will be spent for.

There is complete consensus amongst all the candidates for commissioner that if the pool is to be built, it will be a year around pool that will be dedicated to swim lessons for all schools in the tax district and will have price breaks for admission for all people in the tax district.

In addition, there is complete agreement that the recreation district revenue will also go towards community ball fields for inter-district children's leagues like soccer, softball, Little League and kick ball for the "older" kids to get together.

The cost is only .8 mil, that is \$8 per \$100,000 assessed value, Most folks will pay less than \$20.00/yr but should get back many times that investment in health and fun benefits for our West end of Klickitat county.

#### **Helping the Fire Department** Helps You

Help us by creating defensible space—As people move out of city, the boundaries of wild lands and development continue to blur. Firefighters call this area the wildland urban interface (WUI). Lots of attention is being paid to the WUI these days as the property losses can be catastrophic (for example, the recent fires in Colorado). Your local fire department is physically and mentally prepared to fight these fires, but there are things you can do to help:

- Keep access roads clear of vegetation
- Maintain a 30' defensible space around your home
- Pile firewood and other flammables well away from your home
- Prune trees up 15' and remove excess ground fuels
- Clean out needle chocked gutters
- Screen crawl spaces, attics and decks to keep flying embers out
- Consider a fire resistant roof and exterior siding

Will rescuers find you in an emergency?—Many private roads and driveways in our district remain unmarked or poorly marked. Although they are attractive, wooden signs can blend in with surrounding vegetation or can be obscured by snow. A reflective house number sign is a cheap investment that will facilitate a quick and timely response should you have an emergency.

You can make one, buy one on your own, or you can buy one from our department. We make them up in-house for a donation of \$20, and we'll deliver it to your door so you're sure we know exactly where your house is. The reflective sign should be placed where your private road or driveway intersects the county road system.

Help us get from the county road to your house—Many of our vehicles are just over 11' tall. Our water truck is 30' long, and has a very wide turning radius. Our Aide vehicle and most of our structure fire vehicles are 2-wheel drive. You can help us by:

- keeping overhanging trees trimmed
- remove trees right next to the road that limit maneuverability for big trucks
- Minimize snow and ice buildup on your driveway in the wintertime.

For reference, the Fire Code requires 13' 6" of vertical clearance and 20' of horizontal clearance. New roads must have 20' of surface width. For more information and resources on these topics, refer to our website: www.lylefire.com.

#### Klickitat Trail Conservancy Fall 2010 Hiking and Biking Schedule



Meeting points are given for each event. The public is invited to all the following events. **Lyle Trailhead** is located at the west end of Lyle, just off Hwy 14,

immediately east of the bridge over the Klickitat River. The entrance to the trailhead is a couple hundred yards up on the left side of Hwy 142 as it goes north from Hwy 14. Coming from Portland and I-84, take Exit 64 in Hood River and cross the bridge north over the Columbia. Take a right on Hwy 14 and proceed east through Bingen, and then 9 miles on east to Lyle. Use Hwy 142 to reach the Klickitat Town Park. It is 13 miles north of Lyle in the town of Klickitat. The park is just west of the parking lot for the Canyon Market, the only grocery in town. For more info, check out <u>www.klickitat-trail.org</u>. Please note that smoking and pets are not allowed on KTC sponsored events.

#### Saturday 10/ 9/10—Swale Canyon Bike Ride

Leaders: FoG Outdoor Program Coordinator Maegan Jossy & Jim Denton, KTC Works Chair. [Advanced registration required. This is being held jointly with Friends of the Gorge. To register, call 503-241-3762, ext 103, or go online to www.gorgefriends.org and click on hikes. When you register, details about meeting times and places will be emailed to you. If you do not have email, call Barbara at 541-296-5334.] Moderate/Strenuous: about 13 miles, 1,000 ft. elevation LOSS. Pace of the ride will be moderate. Come with us, enjoy the ride and refresh your soul in the fall air. We will ride from the high prairie of the Goldendale plateau down to the Klickitat River. Experience early fall colors as we follow Swale Creek through the oak, pine and Douglas fir riparian habitats. The trail surface varies from small gravel to large gravel, packed soil, and some obstacles to walk around. It also includes a few trestle crossings. This event will involve a car shuttle. You will

need a mountain bike, helmet, spare tube, and front suspension.

Sunday 10/ 1/ 10—KTC 8th Anniversary & New Lyle Trailhead Celebration Hike (Fisher Hill Bridge to Pitt) Leaders: KTC Board Members Jim Denton, Bev Linde & Barbara Robinson. Free tailgate breakfast before the hike!! Come to the Klickitat River Valley, enjoy the fall colors, and join KTC members for their 8th anniversary hike. We will meet at the new Lyle Trailhead and KTC will treat everyone to a tailgate breakfast before the hike. There will be two hiking options. The first will be a strenuous 8+ mile hike one way from Fisher Hill Bridge to Pitt. This hike involves a car shuttle. The second is a shorter hike, four miles round trip looking at plants, also beginning at Fisher Hill Bridge. The hikes follow the river through oak woodlands. Both hikes are flat on a rocky trail, so sturdy shoes are required. Bring water and a lunch. Meeting Place: 9:30am at the Lyle Trailhead

Saturday 10/23/10—Geology Auto Tour and Hike Leader: Jim Denton. Meet at Lyle and drive up the Klickitat River at least as far as Wahkiakus, and possibly to Harms Rd and Warwick, stopping at points of geological interest along the way. #### PetSmart Charities® Grant Benefits Lyle With a Spay/Neuter Program

It will probably come as no surprise to cat lovers in the Columbia River Gorge that we have a huge population of free-roaming cats.

In an effort to significantly reduce that population, PetSmart Charities<sup>®</sup> recently awarded Catlink, a division of Rowena Wildlife Clinic, a \$35,000 grant to fund spay/neuter clinics around the Gorge over the next two years. Lyle is one of the communities targeted to provide free spay/neuters for free-roaming cats.

The goal of this program is to achieve zero-population growth of free-roaming cats through education, a humane trap-neuterrelease program, and accessible sterilizations in isolated rural areas.



The grant funds will be used for veterinary supplies, traps and carriers. All labor for the program, including that of the veterinarians, will be volunteer. Approximately 1,800 cats will be spayed or neutered over the length of the grant period, which begins immediately. In the first 12 months, Catlink will concentrate on freeroaming cats in Dallesport, Goldendale, Klickitat, Lyle and Wishram. The second year will focus on Mosier, Dufur, Bingen, BZ Corners, Husum and White Salmon.

Last year Catlink spayed or neutered more than 1,500 free-roaming cats. Catlink is an allvolunteer organization with a mission to spay and neuter as many cats as possible, as quickly as possible for the least amount of cost, while giving wild cats the best quality life possible and putting no animal at risk.

The new program will also educate local people on the benefits of spaying and neutering free-roaming cats, as well as provide training and equipment to residents to trap cats.

Susan R. Kerr, a veterinarian on the Rowena Wildlife Clinic board of directors and the WSU-Klickitat County Extension director says, "This grant will improve public health because fewer stray cats mean less excrement in yards, gardens and water; address public safety as more cats will be vaccinated for rabies; and – because many low-income people care for stray cats – it will address poverty by reducing the number of stray cats people have to feed."

Kerr is one of five local veterinarians who have agreed to take part in the program.

#### **Thoughts on Renters Insurance**

Most people carry at least some insurance on their owned homes and cars. As accumulations of personal possessions grow, it's rare that people recognize the total value of their property (clothing, furniture, television or entertainment system, a computer, iPod, musical or sporting equipment or jewelry) is actually quite high and often beyond their means to replace overnight. Thankfully, family, friends and neighbors in our small community tend to help out considerably in times of need, but it's worth thinking about renters insurance.

Renters insurance would not only be useful in the case of loss due to a fire, but potentially also in cases of theft or things like water damage from leaky pipes or a broken water heater. Most auto insurance carriers offer renters insurance and many now offer quotes over the Internet. Call your auto insurance company or do an internet search on 'Renters Insurance' for more information.



#### Burn Ban...

...will be lifted as of October  $1^{st}$ , unless the County decides

that outdoor burning is still too risky. Check with Klickitat County Commissioners or the fire department to see if the burn ban is lifted before you light your burn pile!

Remember that to be legal, burn piles should be no bigger than 4 feet x 4 feet at the base, natural vegetation only, no construction debris, old furniture, or house hold garbage. The burn pile should be at least 50 feet from any structure. There should also be a charged hose (meaning water is on) or a 5 gallon bucket of water at the ready, and it should not be unattended.
